



1.5° FILM CHALLENGE

Guidelines and Eligibility Criteria

Films must be short: only 90-seconds or 1.5 minutes long – like the hoped-for maximum limit on global warming of 1.5 degrees. Films can be made using any technology, but we especially encourage the use of smartphones and tablets. All eligible films submitted to the Challenge will be made available for viewing on Film Access Scotland's website, providing a platform for sharing views on climate change.

- How would you reimagine life, the future for our beautiful country and for our planet?
- What changes would you wish to see to move towards a better future globally?
- Do you have a story and/or experience to share that would inspire people to think and act differently?
- Would climate change affect your home and region in a particular way and how do you think your community would respond?
- How can we rethink how we consume and reconnect with what sustains us?
- What does the motto "Only One Earth" mean to you?
- How can we rethink our relationship to the environment to be more sustainable?

Anyone can submit a film or more than 1 film, as long as:

- Your film is between 60 and 90 seconds in length (between 1 minute and 1 minute 30 seconds).
- The subject and story address the climate crisis.
- All contributors to the making of the film have completed a Release Form granting Film Access Scotland the necessary rights to screen the film and include it in the 1.5° Film Challenge and associated events.
- Credits are included in the 90-second runtime. Please restrict your credits to no more than 5-10 seconds.
- The film does not feature any branded logos, copyright material or other content you do not have permission to use (this includes music, images, videos and use of a person's name, image or likeness without their consent).
- The film does not include any material which could be considered libellous to individuals, organisations or companies.
- The film meets our appropriate content guidelines: the film must be suitable for everyone to watch and should not contain graphic material that would reasonably be considered unsuitable for all ages; we will not accept films that personally name individuals, organisations or companies who have not given their consent, or films that are derogatory or overtly negative.
